From the East...



Greetings Brethren,

One of the most impactful and important of the Masonic Rites are the Obligations, Oaths and Penalties. These are all recited "Before God and Man", and should be indelibly engraved upon our minds by constant repetition, privately at home during our leisure hours and during the Degrees.

The root word of obligation comes from the Latin "obligare", which means a promise and also that which enjoins obedience. The obligation and the manner in which it is taken constitute visible and audible evidence of the candidate's sincerity and purpose. Without it, nothing the Freemason might say or do could be considered binding. By taking it of his own free will, he gives irrevocable evidence of his intentions.

Thus, the Fraternity not only binds him to certain responsibilities, among which are to protect itself against a revelation of the secrets of Freemasonry, which have to do with the obligations, methods of recognition and of the symbolic instructions.

An obligation is not the same as an oath. An oath is the binding clause at the end of the formal, legal obligation. An example could be in a court of law where a witness takes an obligation to "tell the whole truth and nothing but the truth," the conclusion is made by saying, "So help me God", which constitutes the oath. The oath can be considered a person's "fear of God" (consequences for failure to perform). The obligation in the above example signifies the promises and agreements made prior to the oath.

The penalties associated with failure to perform the obligations can be perplexing to the reflecting mind of a Freemason. The Masonic penalties are our ties to the Middle Ages, as are the Working Tools. Both are symbolic and allegorical in modern day usage, in other words, the second layer of meaning to both. The ritual penalties (abhorrent or barbaric to the modern mind) are retained because of their historical significance and impact upon the mind. The violation of a Masonic obligation is a serious offense, which may cause a Mason to feel that he deserves the kind of punishment the literal penalties describe (infliction by God). The actual penalty that can legally be inflicted by man may range a formal reprimand to expulsion from the Fraternity.

Constant repetition and reflecting upon our obligations and the associated penalties slowly start to change us for the better, thus coming closer to the vaunted perfection of mind and Spirit we all aspire to.
