From the East...



Greetings Brethren,

A universally recognized and remembered symbol of Speculative Masonry is the lambskin or white leather apron. It is tangible evidence of our admission into the Fraternity, a constant reminder to live a pure and upright life as well as a constant reminder of our mortality. At our funeral, deposited with our lifeless remains, pure and unstained as the day that we received it.

The apron, or some equivalent mode of investiture, in the mystic rites throughout the world was used from antiquity. The apron, in particular, was given as an honorary and exalted badge distinction. The principal honor of the apron consisted in its reference to innocence of conduct and purity of heart regarding our thoughts, words and actions. The white, unblemished color of the apron symbolizes purity. The color white has been associated with innocence and purity in the Jewish, Roman, Essenes, Rites of Mithras and Druidic mystic rites. Early Christians invested the newly baptized with a pure white robe to symbolize cleansing of sins and an exhortation to live a life of purity.

The apron's material must be made of lambskin. The lamb has always been considered an emblem of innocence. Wearing the lambskin is for Masons a constant reminder to always live a pure and upright life.

The Apron is said to be more ancient and honorable than certain orders and decorations. The Order of the Golden Fleece was founded by Philip, Duke of Normandy in 1429, the Roman Eagle was Rome's symbol of power and might, the Order of the Star was created by John II of France in mid Fourteenth Century and the Order of the Garter was founded in 1349 by Edward III of England as a decoration for himself and twenty five of his knights, all collectively called the Knights of the Garter.

The Grand Lodge of England's constitution precisely defines the Masonic apron's dimensions for each of the three degrees. American lodges do not necessarily follow these regulations. The simple white apron has been allowed to be adorned with all sorts of frills and other symbols.

One of those additions is the downward pointing triangle. I could not find a reference to this innovation. The following is a synopsis of my own interpretation of the apron with the downward pointing triangle. The square and the triangle, taken together is a symbol of my mortal self. The square, symbolizes the physical body that is composed of the alchemical elements of Fire, Air, Water and Earth. That immortal spark of the Divine, symbolized by the downward pointing triangle, in turn, animates the physical body. The apron is my constant reminder of not only my mortality, but also what it is that I came here to do. The downward pointing triangle, according to linear thinking, is a portion of the Divine coming from above. However if we believe that our Creator is everywhere present, then the square and the triangle considered together accurately describe our relationship to our Creator and the cosmos.

Degrees Conferred








Fellowcraft

Our Impact


